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► **Section I. CDAS Objectives :**

The Centre for Developing-Area Studies (CDAS) continues to serve as an important scholarly forum for interdisciplinary research on international development issues now under McGill's Office of the Vice-Principal (Research). Its main objective continues to be to conduct research on developing areas and development issues with the active involvement of graduate students, faculty members and post-doctoral researchers who come from the Faculties of Arts, Education, Law, Science, Medicine as well as Agricultural and Environmental Sciences. In addition, the CDAS

- encourages and provides an opportunity for inter-university research, nationally and internationally;
- helps to train graduate students as researchers in the field of international development; and
- contributes to international debates on pressing development issues through seminars, colloquia, publications and specialized library materials.

As in past years, the CDAS, established in 1963, has had an active number of diverse researchers or Fellows (listed in **Appendix III, XI and XII**) as well as a wide network of international scholarly contacts with which it carried out its research throughout this academic year. In addition to conducting research in the field, the CDAS -- through its publications, academic journal, specialized library collection, regular seminars, workshops and conferences -- continued to carry forth its research mandate to address some of the most troubling issues of our time. As the world confronts issues of poverty, global inequalities, armed conflicts and new information technologies, scholars at CDAS engaged in research on these international development issues have distinguished themselves in various ways elaborated in this report.

The conjuncture of a changing world context, the end of my first mandate as CDAS Director and an FCAR infrastructure Centre grant application, all provided the opportunity for the CDAS community of researchers to be involved in discussions about our next five-year research program, 2001-2006. CDAS research for the first "Strategic Plan, 1996-2001" described in the past Annual Reports had been organized to ensure our financial survival. Now, as the CDAS moves beyond mere survival and I enter my second mandate, we have mapped out our research plan under four broad programmatic clusters or axes: 1) gender and human security, 2) poverty and work, 3) globalization and inequality, and 4) alternatives to development. While we continue to be open to all forms of inquiry regarding development research, our primary objective is to consolidate our research within these broad clusters which are interdisciplinary, cut across various themes, and implicate all regions of the developing world where our researchers conduct their work – Asia, Africa, Latin America, the Caribbean and the Middle East. During this second mandate, we shall continue to work with McGill colleagues as well as researchers in the other Montreal universities, other parts of Canada and abroad.

► **Section II. Highlights:**

During 2000/2001, with secure funding for some of our cooperative research made possible by the collective efforts and commitment of faculty, students, associate members and visiting scholars as well as the dedicated CDAS staff, there were several highlights in CDAS' diverse research program. Each of these contributes to the renewal of CDAS as a leading Canadian research institution on international development within Quebec and abroad. Our highlights section begins with a description of the vital research we are conducting on one of the most pressing problems of our time – the plight of civilians increasingly affected by violent political conflicts.

***Gender and Human Security Issues Program***

The CDAS completed its first year of the three-year SSHRC-funded (\$600,000.) action-research program on Gender and Human Security Issues which is being carried out in cooperation with the Women's Centre of Montreal and several other academic units described more fully in last year's Annual Report. During this year, the program provided funding for two research assistantships concerning refugees, women's organizations and peacebuilding (Karen Barnes, M.A. student and Manal Jamal, PhD student), two professors for course release (Prof. Bilkis Bissandjée, Univ. de Montréal and Prof. Claudia Mitchell, Education, McGill), three internships at the Women's Centre and field research (Dr Rosalind Boyd) in the Great Lakes region (Rwanda and Uganda). The latter field research conducted in cooperation with our regional partner, the Eastern African Sub-regional Support Initiative for the Advancement of Women (EASSI), resulted in the publication of a resource document on women's organizations working for peace and reconciliation in the Great Lakes region. Several other scholarly publications and a workshop are planned in the coming year.

The principal investigator for this research is CDAS Director Dr Rosalind Boyd who is working with an interdisciplinary team of scholars from McGill (Profs. Rex Brynen, Claudia Mitchell and Shree Mulay), Concordia (Prof. Miranda D'Amico) and the University of Montreal (Prof. Bissandjee). The research in this program is addressing several issues simultaneously: conceptualization problems related to human security, political reconciliation and issues of trauma, multilateral peace-building initiatives in relation to grassroots organizations as well as developing a model of intervention for treating those traumatized by armed conflicts.

***Montreal Inter-university Initiative on International Development***

This initiative, which is based at the CDAS, funded by IDRC and led by a team of professors from the four Montreal-area universities, has multi-faceted and long-term plans. This year, we focused on two main goals: building a successful and challenging internship program for graduate students and designing an on-line IDS course catalogue of graduate-level international development courses being offered at the four Montreal universities. To that end, the CDAS established its first graduate internship program, in order to foster the training of graduate students in research on international development. Each of the four interns selected – Hande Paker (PhD student, Sociology, McGill), Guy Tremblay (Maitrise, Géographie, UQAM), Raphaëlle Valay-Nadeau (Maitrise, Anthropologie, Université de Montréal) and Jessica Cattaneo (M.A. Student, Anthropology, Concordia) worked on a

specific research project in addition to participating in a range of other research activities during their term in residence at CDAS from September 2000 – January 2001.

Once again, we also had a successful program of **Inter-university Faculty Seminars on International Development** throughout the year involving members at the four Montreal universities. These seminars (listed as **Appendix VII**) as well as those by CDAS Fellows and ad hoc visitors (**Appendix IX**) stimulated diverse debates on pertinent issues throughout the year and attracted graduate students, professors and researchers from McGill and other institutions as well as the public at large who are involved in international development research. The presentation and book launching in cooperation with Véhicule Press on “The Water Gods: The Inside Story of a World Bank Project in Nepal” (12 January 2001) and the special Roundtable on Globalization and Development with the Cuban economist Lic. Faustino Cobarrubia Gomez (20 October 2000) were particularly well attended and noteworthy. The latter’s article was translated and published in *Labour, Capital and Society* with an excellent feedback from colleagues in India.

### ***International Conference on Development: The Need for Reflection***

Another significant highlight during this academic year was the International Conference entitled **“Development: The Need for Reflection”** which took place at McGill from 21-23 September 2000 with the participation of 21 researchers, many of whom came from abroad (see **Appendix IV** for the names of the Visiting Conference Scholars). The Conference and subsequent publication of the presentations were both made possible by an SSHRC grant obtained by CDAS Research Associate Myriam Gervais and CDAS Faculty Fellow, Prof. Myron Echenberg (History, McGill). This activity stimulated lively debates and much discussion on the pertinent questioning of development from various perspectives. Both theoreticians and practitioners were brought together to reconsider and reflect on development and to set out new priorities for research. CDAS graduate student Fellows, including the four interns, served as rapporteurs for the Conference and were exposed to an interdisciplinary forum with some leading thinkers debating the central issues of international development.

### ***Internship Program Abroad***

Once again, the CDAS received a CIDA Youth Internship Program grant (\$30,000.) in cooperation with the Canadian-Palestinian Educational Exchange (CEPAL) which affirmed our priority work with non-governmental organizations (NGOs) to build students’ practical formation in international development. Two interns, Andrea Becker and Samira Hussain, spent six months living and working in the Palestinian refugee camps in Lebanon then returned to continue their research at CDAS.

### ***Pending Collaborative Research projects***

At the end of this academic year, two research programs are awaiting decisions and have implications for our long-term research program. The three-year project “Canada-Cuba Economic Relations in the context of NAFTA” which was developed with a team at CDAS (Prof. Frankman and Dr Boyd) and the Centre for the Study of International Economy (CIEI), Universidad de La Habana, was awarded \$200,000 by IDRC pending approval by the Cuban government. As well, the

CDAS made an application to FCAR for a six-year Centre grant (\$2.1 million) in which 22 researchers/professors primarily from the four Montreal-based universities elaborated a broad research plan in collaboration with seven international institutions that we have worked with over the past decade. The decision about this grant is expected in November 2001.

## ► **Section III. Planning and Performance:**

### **B. Teaching (FTE’s and WSU’s)**

As CDAS is a research unit, there are no credited McGill courses taught out of the CDAS. Faculty Fellows teach undergraduate and graduate courses on International Development within their respective departments. The CDAS also continues to take an active role in supporting the **Undergraduate Program in International Development Studies (IDS)** and many of our members are part of its Advisory Committee.

As in past years, the CDAS was called upon to provide **short-term courses**. One short training program on academic publishing was provided for IAIN Sunan Kalijaga Academic Press at the request of McGill’s Indonesian-Canada Islamic Higher Education Project. The four interns from the Montreal Inter-university Initiative joined part of this program to improve their knowledge of the process of academic research publishing of books and journal articles.

As part of the Montreal Inter-university Initiative on International Development, Prof. Carmen Lambert gave a short course on Research Methodology to the four interns. We also continued to update a **selected listing of graduate courses** on development that are being taught at the four Montreal universities. The idea is to make these courses better known to potential students of international development with the long-term objective of strengthening the capacity of McGill to offer a joint cooperative M.A. and/or PhD program in international development studies.

### **D. Research**

Research is the *raison d’être* of the CDAS and all of those associated with CDAS are engaged in individual and/or team research (see **Appendix III, XI and XII** for the detailed research interests of CDAS members). As is demonstrated, researchers work on development issues from various disciplines, covering a variety of themes and within different regions of the so-called developing areas (Asia, Africa, the Caribbean, Latin America and the Middle East). In the above section related to highlights, we have described the major collective research of the CDAS. ## **E. Academic Staff**

Academic staff members associated with the CDAS during this academic year are listed in **Appendix III and XI** as Faculty Fellows. As mentioned, these faculty members are from various disciplines and at least six McGill faculties. For this year, there were 24 McGill faculty actively involved in CDAS research programs, committees, networking, conferences and/or seminar presentations of their research. Academic staff are also involved in publishing of books and articles in international journals concerned with development. These activities as well as their professional associations are listed in the various Appendices at the end of this report.

Once again, the CDAS had three academic staff members whose *only* affiliation is in this unit:

1. Rosalind Boyd (PhD Humanities, Concordia), CDAS Director, 1997-2001; reappointed from 2001-2004.
2. Myriam Gervais (PhD Political Science, UQAM), Senior Research Associate, 1999-2001
3. Izzud-Din Pal (PhD Economics, McGill), Adjunct Professor, 2000-2002

In the coming year, we have agreed to cooperate with the Faculty of Law to bring a Visiting Professor of Law to McGill. Prof. Daniel Haile, formerly the Dean of Law, Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, will be in residence at the CDAS from January –December 2002. He will be funded partly from our IDRC grant to work on gender and labour in Africa.

## **► Section IV. Evaluation of performance: pertaining to objectives**

### ***New avenues of research***

As mentioned in the opening section, the CDAS has secured major funding to carry out research within one of its four broad clusters for the next three years. New faculty members, researchers and new graduate students have been funded by the CDAS to conduct research this year, particularly in relation to the Gender and Human Security Program and the Montreal Inter-university Initiative. As well, several CDAS members have received funding to carry out their own research. New cooperative research initiatives with colleagues at the three sister universities and institutions abroad are also now pending. In addition, we have entered into discussions with international visitors (listed in **Appendix IV**) on possible collaborative research in the coming year.

### ***Forums for debate***

Once again, the CDAS organized three different forums (Inter-university Faculty seminars, Fellows seminars and Ad hoc Visitors seminars) for presentations on various issues related to development research throughout the year. These seminars were the basis for deepening discussions towards new research programs in the coming year. The CDAS also hosted an important international conference with participants from various parts of the world that helped to re-position our CDAS researchers within the debates with leading thinkers on development from various parts of the world. The CDAS continued to expand its community of researchers in new directions and to facilitate its members with the opportunity for critical debate and exchange, some of the primary objectives of the research institution.

### ***National and international recognition***

In addition to research and publications output, many of our members were involved in professional organizations and community activities (**Appendix X**) on a voluntary basis. They also continued to participate in international conferences and seminars in Montreal, other parts of Canada and in various parts of the world, notably China, Cuba, France, India, Indonesia, Mexico and Uganda (listed in **Appendix VIII**) which affirms their contributions to the debates related to international development issues while promoting the CDAS and McGill. As well, the CDAS published two issues of its academic journal, *Labour, Capital and Society* which is financed by SSHRC and IDRC as well as paid subscribers from all over the world. The current members of the journal's inter-university Editorial Committee are listed in **Appendix VI**. The journal is also currently on exchange with 125 important research publications that are deposited in our library, and provide the bulk of our serials, especially important journals.

### ***Specialized library collection***

For a research institution in the field of international development, one of the most highly valued resources is its specialized library material. This is particularly true for CDAS as so much of its research work is concerned with contemporary struggles and debates which are found in so-called "shadow literature" and specialized journals. The CDAS library collection is unique in Quebec and Canada. The increasing number of Inter-Library Loan requests is a strong indicator of the importance of library materials. Throughout this academic year, it has remained available to students, staff, NGOs, consultants and the wider scholarly community and has added valuable new acquisitions thanks to the exchanges and to funding from IDRC. A complete list of recent CDAS acquisitions are regularly listed on the Centre's website, which is managed by the CDAS librarian who also maintains the research project related websites. In the coming year, we plan to redesign and upgrade our website in accordance with the web protocols of McGill. Cataloguing of the CDAS collection and of new acquisitions has also been aided this year by the volunteer assistance from a first year Master's student from McGill's Graduate School of Library and Information Studies.

### ***Research formation outcomes***

As mentioned in our objectives, the CDAS is committed to training graduate students in international development research. We have described the graduate internship program as one of

our highlights this year. However, performance is also evaluated by what happens to our researchers “after CDAS”. Three students who have been associated with our research programs deserve to be mentioned this year: **Karen Barnes** who worked as a research assistant on women’s organizations in the Great Lakes region of Africa received an internship on the UNHCR Women’s Refugee program in Geneva. Also, through her research involvement at CDAS, she has shifted the focus of her M.A. thesis in Political Science to be more directly involved in gender concerns. **Andrea Becker**, associated in various ways for the past four years with research at CDAS and a graduate of McGill’s International Development Studies Program, accepted a two-year appointment with Oxfam-Quebec to work in Ramallah. **Eugenia Zorbas**, also a graduate of McGill’s IDS program, a former CDAS/CEPAL and research assistant, successfully completed her M.Sc. with distinction at the London School of Economics. She will now take up a two-year position in Amman, Jordan to assist with building self-help business programs for women. These are but three of many concrete examples of how research training at CDAS builds the capacity of students to be employed in international development activities.

### ***Publication accolades***

Another indicator for evaluating the CDAS is the reception that publications by CDAS researchers receive. While many publications by CDAS researchers are listed at the end of this report in the appendices, one example stands out this year. Dr Izzud-Din Pal, CDAS Adjunct Professor, received an outstanding review of his book *Pakistan, Islam and Economics: Failure of Modernity* (Karachi: Oxford University Press, 1999, 195pp.) in the *International Journal of Middle East Studies* (33:1, 2001) which stated “this excellent study offers a critical analysis of the Islamic economic system” and that “Pal is to be commended for making a series of rich and important issues an writings (many in Urdu) accessible to a wide audience”.

### ***Tribute to a CDAS legacy***

Finally, following the death of Prof. Peter Gutkind on 17 February 2001 in England, a group of Peter’s former colleagues and friends gathered in the CDAS library to celebrate Peter and his work; a fuller tribute will appear in a forthcoming special issue on Zimbabwe of *Labour, Capital and Society (LC&S)*. During his tenure at McGill as a Professor of Anthropology (1963-1987), Peter was actively involved with research on the labouring poor and defined much of the CDAS’ progressive research work on Africa. He also regularly contributed a Bibliography on Unemployment to *LC&S*. Fittingly, the CDAS library has been renamed the Gutkind Library. Peter served as an important inspiration to researchers who shared our concern for the poor, the unemployed, those marginalized and unjustly treated in all parts of the world; these remain the central concerns of our research up till today.

As part of the four broad clusters elaborated in the opening pages of this Annual Report, the CDAS researchers will continue to find possible solutions to our global problems, notably militarization and conflict, poverty and marginalization, social injustice, and environmental degradation, through continued collaboration with our colleagues in the South.
