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➤ Section I. **CDAS OBJECTIVES**

The Centre for Developing-Area Studies (CDAS) remains an important scholarly forum for interdisciplinary research on international development issues under McGill's Office of the Vice-Principal (Research). Its main objective is to conduct research on developing areas and development issues with the active involvement of graduate students, faculty members and post-doctoral researchers who come from the Faculties of Arts, Education, Law, Science, as well as Agricultural and Environmental Sciences. In addition, the CDAS

- encourages and provides an opportunity for inter-university research, nationally and internationally;
- helps to train graduate students as researchers in the field of international development; and
- contributes to international debates on pressing development issues through seminars, colloquia, publications and specialized library materials.

During this academic year, the CDAS continued its commitment to work with many researchers and Fellows with diverse interests (listed in **Appendix III, XI and XII**) as well as with a broad network of international scholarly contacts. In addition to conducting research in the field, the CDAS -- through its publications, academic journal, specialized library collection, regular seminars, workshops and conferences -- continues to carry forth its research mandate to address some of the most troubling issues of our time. As the world constantly adjusts to life-changing events, scholars at CDAS make meaningful contributions to the ongoing dialogue on development issues such as poverty, global inequalities, armed conflicts and new information technologies. These significant contributions are elaborated in this report.

As mentioned in last year's Annual Report, when my second mandate as CDAS Director (2001-2004) began, we set out a five-year research agenda (2001-2006) around four broad programmatic clusters or axes: 1) gender and human security, 2) poverty and work, 3) globalization and inequality, and 4) alternatives to development. During this academic year, our objective was to consolidate our research through new grants within these broad clusters which are interdisciplinary, cut across various themes, and implicate all regions of the so-called developing world where our researchers conduct their work – Asia, Africa, Latin America, the Caribbean and the Middle East. While an impressive list of research funding has been received, individually and collectively (see **Section III. D. Research and Appendix XIII**), what was not anticipated for this year was my own need to take a six-month medical leave of absence. Fortunately, Professor Myron Frankman, a long-time member of the CDAS, was able to step in as Acting Director during my absence and the bulk of our research objectives continued without interruption. The smooth running of our research activities was also attributable to the collective efforts and commitment of faculty, students, associate members and visiting scholars (described throughout this report) as well as the dedicated CDAS staff, listed on the final page of this report. To each of them, I extend my appreciation and thanks for the work that they have done throughout this year.

➤ Section II. **HIGHLIGHTS**

During the 2001-2002 academic year, with on-going secure funding for our cooperative research program, there are several highlights to mention as part of the record of activities. We begin with a description of the activities of our main SSHRC-funded research program, which focuses on the plight of civilians, particularly women and children affected by violent political conflicts and war.

Gender and Human Security Issues Program

The Gender and Human Security Issues Program (GHSIP) completed its second year of a three-year program (\$600,000.) in collaboration with the Women's Centre of Montreal and several other academic units, described more fully in the Newsletters and available on our website. The program published its first Discussion Paper under the heading of Gender and Human Security Issues. The paper is entitled *Women's Organizations Working for Peace and Reconciliation in the Great Lakes Region of Africa* and was written by Dr Rosalind Boyd following her fieldwork in September 2000; it also integrates research compiled over several years.

As a recipient of financing from the GHSIP, Manal Jamal, CDAS Student Fellow and PhD candidate in Political Science, was able to spend four months in Palestine investigating the gender dimension of popular organizations and the process of democratization. In the spring, Ms. Jamal also spent four months in El Salvador conducting fieldwork on the impact of international aid on the reconstruction of civil society during the process of peacebuilding.

Another highlight for the CDAS from this program was the all-day Workshop involving several partners in the GHSIP which took place on 9 November 2001. The GHSIP research involves an interdisciplinary team of scholars from McGill, Concordia and the University of Montreal as well as partners from the community and abroad. The Workshop provided an excellent opportunity to increase the participants' understanding of the research undertaken by each partner and to see how each dimension of the research contributes to the overall program. Partners from both the community and the university, including more than thirty people, participated in the Workshop. The Graduate Interns from the Inter-University Initiative on International Development also participated as *rapporteurs*. The active participation of Maude Mugisha, the GHSIP's special guest from Uganda, and Coordinator of our partner organization in the field, EASSI (Eastern African Sub-regional Support Initiative for the Advancement of Women) contributed greatly to strengthening our partnership and our appreciation of the struggles women in that region of Africa face, due to poverty and war.

Near the end of the academic year, as part of the program, two new projects were approved for funding. Professor Shree Mulay's study entitled "Women Refugees from South Asia: Uncovering the Exploitation Trail" involves the program's extension beyond African women to include the concerns of another community organization in Montreal, the South Asian Women's Community Centre. The GHSIP also approved funding for EASSI to organize a workshop entitled "Training Workshop on Documentation" to be held in Kampala, Uganda. The goal of this workshop is to increase the capacity of six participants, one from each country of the African Great Lakes region, to establish a system of documentation that will enable them to keep a record of their experiences and to document the lessons learnt regarding the peace initiatives they have organized in Africa.

Montreal Inter-university Initiative on International Development

This initiative, funded by IDRC and led by a team of professors from the four Montreal-area universities, has multi-faceted and long-term plans. This year, it focused on two main goals: to develop a dynamic and well-rounded internship program for graduate level students, and to create a database of professors of international development teaching in Montreal. The Inter-University Faculty Seminar Series (**Appendix XI**) provided an important forum for getting to know the research of faculty members from the four universities.

The five Graduate Interns this year were Chloe Frommer (Anthropology, McGill University), Mamadou dit Ndong Dimé (Sociology, Université de Montréal), Pascale Hatcher (Political Science, UQAM), François Michaud (Anthropology, Université de Montréal) and Sharmilla Pillai (Education, Concordia University). Each of these interns worked on independent research topics with the help of CDAS methodology training. They also participated in CDAS seminars and events. The interns benefited from the input of Professor Leslie Orr (Religion, Concordia University) and Professor Victor Armony (Sociology, UQAM), who conducted methodology workshops with the interns during the month of November 2001.

Final presentations by the CDAS graduate interns were held in March 2002 culminating in five independent presentations of research topics. François Michaud presented his research sur “La réforme agraire aux Philippines- racines historiques et perspectives actuelles”, Mamadou Dit Ndong Dime sur « Les Nouvelles formes de marginalisation socio-économique et évolution des systèmes de solidarité en milieu urbain africain : un état des lieux » et Pascale Hatcher sur « La réforme de l'aide au développement : des normes, multilateralisation et instrumentalisation des ONGs ». Chloe Frommer gave a presentation on « Bodies, Capsules and Fetishes : The Transfer of Control over Traditional Medicinal Knowledge in Zimbabwe » and Sharmila Pillai, « Ascertaining the Real Needs in African Education : The Case of Grade 2 Science in the Amharic Speaking Regions of Ethiopia ».

Another highlight of this year's Inter-University program was an all-day Conference entitled *Who OWNS Development?* that was held at the CDAS on 22 February 2002 and organized primarily by the Graduate Interns. Professor Pierre Beaucage (Université de Montréal) hosted the day, which featured Professor Dorval Brunelle (Department of Sociology, UQAM) as the keynote speaker. The workshops encouraged inter-disciplinary debate amongst activists, scholars and interested citizens on some of the critical issues of development. This event was well attended and offered the interns a unique opportunity for hands-on experience organizing an academic event.

Dr. Daniel Haile - Visiting Professor

In cooperation with the Faculty of Law, the CDAS welcomed Professor Daniel Haile in January 2002 as a Visiting Professor for one year. Professor Haile is formerly the Dean of Law, Addis Ababa, in Ethiopia and is funded partly from our IDRC grant to work on gender and labour in Africa. Dr. Haile presented *The Legal Status of Ethiopian Women in Formal Sector Employment* as part of the Inter-University Initiative Seminar Series. In addition to teaching in the Law Faculty, Professor Haile has been an active participant in CDAS research activities.

CDAS Panel Discussion

Another one of CDAS' highlights this year was its panel discussion held in April 2002 with the theme: "A New Great Game: The Geopolitics of Central Asia". This event was organized by one of our associate fellows, Ihab Hashim whose research interests include: Human dimensions of environmental change; environmental degradation and sustainable development; Africa, Middle East and Central Asia. The panel discussion provided introductory comments on the efforts made by both regional and global powers to exert their strategic and economic influence in Central Asia over the last decade.

The Uyghur Community of Central Asia

Often forgotten in the whirl of international development with its focus primarily on socio-economic and political issues is the importance of culture. The CDAS in April 2002 sponsored a forum to highlight and promote the rich heritage of the Uyghur people, their culture and their history. The Uyghurs are the indigenous people who reside in the Xinjiang Uyghur Autonomous Region of the People's Republic of China and are mainly of the Islamic faith. The presentation and discussion that followed also included topics on the recent political developments in Central Asia and their Region.

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B. Teaching (FTE's and WSU's)

As CDAS is a research unit, there are no credited McGill courses offered at CDAS. Faculty Fellows teach undergraduate and graduate courses on International Development within their respective departments. The CDAS also continues to take an active role in supporting the **Undergraduate Program in International Development (IDS)** and many of our members are part of its Advisory Committee. The IDS Seminars are held at CDAS, which encourages IDS students to discover the unique collection of research materials available in the Gutkind Library.

We also continued to update a selected listing of graduate courses on development that are being taught at the four Montreal universities. The idea is to make these courses better known to potential students of international development with the long-term objective of strengthening the capacity of McGill to offer a joint cooperative M. A. and/or PhD program in international development studies.

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D. Research

Research is the foundation of the CDAS and all of those associated with CDAS are engaged in individual and/or team research (see **Appendix III, XI and XII** for the detailed research interests of CDAS members). Researchers work on development issues from various disciplines, covering a variety of themes and within different regions of the so-called developing areas (Asia, Africa, the Caribbean, Latin America and the Middle East). ➤ Section IV. EVALUATION AND PERFORMANCE: PERTAINING TO OBJECTIVES

New Avenues of Collaborative Research

As mentioned in the opening section of this report, the CDAS has secured major funding for its work on gender and human security issues for three years. It has allotted new funding to pursue research concerning women refugees from South Asia that involves Professor Shree Mulay and other researchers.

In addition, the CDAS welcomed Professors Madhav Badami and Victor Armony to the already bustling network of CDAS Faculty Fellows, listed in **Appendix III and XI**. Professor Badami is an Assistant Professor at the McGill School of Urban Planning and the School of the Environment. His research interests include urban environmental issues and sustainable urban transport in less-industrialized countries, particularly in Asia. In January 2002, Prof. Badami presented a seminar on *Pollution, People, Politics, and Policy: The Case of Motor Vehicles in India*, as part of the Inter-University Faculty Seminar Series.

Professor Victor Armony is currently working in the department of Sociology at the Université du Québec à Montréal (UQAM) and is associate professor of Sociology at the University of Ottawa. He was a visiting professor at the l'Universidad de Buenos Aires (Argentina) in 2000 and at the

l'Universidad Internacional de Andalucía (Espagne) in 2001. He has published numerous articles in the political domain including *Représenter la nation: le discours présidentiel de l'Argentine post-autoritaire* (Montréal: Balzac, 2000). His current research interests include comparative politics in Latin America focussing on national identity and minority populations in the global context. As an active member of the Inter-University Initiative, Professor Armony conducted methodology workshops with the five Graduate Interns, presented a seminar entitled *Emerging Social and Ethnic Identities in Latin America* as part of the Seminar Series and worked as a member of the committee for the Inter-University Initiative on International Development.

Forums for Debate

As part of its ongoing commitment to community and international debates, the CDAS participated in this year's "Governing Globalisation" seminar series as part of the *60 Days to the Kananaskis G8 Summit in Alberta*. This was hosted by McGill University's International Development Studies Program in collaboration with the Montreal Chapter of the Canadian Institute for International Affairs. Among the invitees was Ambassador Robert F. Fowler, Prime Minister of Canada's Personal Representative for the G8 Summit and for Africa. Having recently returned from Africa with the Prime Minister, Ambassador Fowler also addressed the "New Partnership for Africa's Development" (NEPAD), which was the principal focus of both discussion and a concrete action plan to be adopted by the G8 leaders in Kananaskis. The CDAS also organized a series of Inter-University Faculty Seminars (see **Appendix VII**), held an important Workshop on its primary collaborative research program and provided a forum for various Fellows and Ad Hoc Seminars (listed in **Appendix IX**). Conference presentations given by CDAS members (listed in **Appendix VIII**) illustrate the diversity of research interests.

Publication Contributing to International Debate

Marking the 20th anniversary of Zimbabwe's independence in a disturbing historical moment, the CDAS journal, *LABOUR, Capital and Society/TRAVAIL, capital et société* devoted a special thematic issue to the achievements and failures of these first two decades. In particular, the articles analyze the role of the state and labour in structural change and social transformation, attempting to understand Zimbabwe's decline. Guest edited by Professor Suzanne Dansereau (Saint Mary's University) with contributions by international scholars, including Patrick Bond (University of Witwatersrand), Suzanne Dansereau, Brian Raftopoulos (University of Zimbabwe) and Blair Rutherford (University of Regina), the issue is indeed very timely. Several recent books are also reviewed in the special issue.

This year, CDAS received a renewal of its grant from the SSHRC for another three years to continue publishing *Labour Capital and Society*. The current members of the journal's inter-university Editorial Committee are listed in **Appendix VI**. The Journal is also currently on exchange with 125 important research publications that are deposited in our library, and provide the bulk of our serials, especially important journals.

Specialized library collection – Gutkind Library

In order to conduct research on international development, one of the most highly valued resources is to have available specialized library materials. This is particularly true for CDAS as so much of its research work is concerned with contemporary struggles and debates which are found in so-called

“shadow literature” and specialized journals. Acquired over the past 25 years, the collection in the CDAS’ Gutkind Library (named in honour of the late Peter Gutkind, anthropologist, Africanist and labour studies scholar at McGill) is unique in Quebec and Canada. The increasing number of Inter-Library Loan requests is a strong indicator of the importance of library materials. Throughout this academic year, the Gutkind Library has remained available to students, staff, NGOs, consultants and the wider scholarly community and has added valuable new acquisitions thanks to the exchanges and to funding from IDRC. A complete list of recent CDAS acquisitions is maintained on the Centre’s website, which is managed by the CDAS librarian who also maintains the research project related websites. In the past year, the CDAS website has been re-designed and upgraded in accordance with the newly developed web protocols of McGill’s Web Communication Group (WCG). Cataloguing of the CDAS collection and of new acquisitions for our in-house library database has also been aided this year by the volunteer assistance from a first year Master’s student from McGill’s Graduate School of Library and Information Studies.

Future Research Endeavours

In January, CDAS representatives and the partners in the Gender and Human Security Program met with Marc Renaud (President of SSHRC) and Pamela Wiggin (Vice-president, chargée à mobilisation des connaissances) at CDAS. They were visiting each of the CURA programs supported by the SSHRC in order to exchange ideas about the goals of this new program. This meeting helped to indicate new priorities for the program. The CDAS is planning to apply for a two-year completion grant (2004-2006) for this program.

In Memoria

Finally, we are saddened to report the passing of two of our CDAS colleagues. Dr Charles I. Stastny, CDAS Associate Fellow for over a decade and founder of the Refugee Research Project, passed away on 5 June 2001. A moving memorial and birthday celebration for Charles was held at the CDAS on 1 November 2001. Professor Theo Hills, one of the founding members of the CDAS, its first Associate Director and its second Director, died in the Spring of 2002. He was an active scholar of the Caribbean and the humid tropics. Both will be missed.
