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➤ **Section I. CDAS OBJECTIVES**

The Centre for Developing-Area Studies (CDAS) remains an important scholarly forum for interdisciplinary research on international development issues under McGill's Office of the Vice-Principal (Research). Its main objective is to conduct research on developing areas and development issues with the active involvement of graduate students, faculty members and post-doctoral researchers who come from the Faculties of Arts, Education, Engineering, Law, Science, as well as Agricultural and Environmental Sciences. In addition, the CDAS

- encourages and provides an opportunity for inter-university research, nationally and internationally;
- helps to train graduate students as researchers in the field of international development; and
- contributes to international debates on pressing development issues through seminars, colloquia, publications and specialized library materials.

During this academic year, the CDAS continued its commitment to work with many researchers and Fellows with diverse interests (listed in **Appendix IV, XII and XIV**) as well as with a broad network of international scholarly contacts. In addition to conducting research in the field, the CDAS -- through its publications, academic journal, specialized library collection, regular seminars, workshops and conferences -- continues to carry forth its research mandate to address some of the most troubling issues of our time. Scholars at CDAS make meaningful contributions to the ongoing dialogue on development issues such as poverty, global inequalities, armed conflicts and new information technologies. These significant contributions are elaborated in this report.

As mentioned in last year's Annual Report, under my second mandate as CDAS Director (2001-2004), we continue to work with the five-year research agenda (2001-2006) around four broad programmatic clusters or axes: 1) gender and human security, 2) poverty and work, 3) globalization and inequality, and 4) alternatives to development. During this academic year, our objective was to consolidate our research within these broad clusters which are interdisciplinary, cut across various themes, and implicate all regions of the so-called developing world where our researchers conduct their work -- Asia, Africa, Latin America, the Caribbean and the Middle East. An impressive list of research funding has been received, individually and collectively (see **Section III. D. Research, Appendix I and Appendix XVI**) during this academic year. Lists of other research contributions can also be found in the many appendices. We have had an engaging and productive year.

Established in 1963, the CDAS is celebrating its 40th year of continuous research production and remains a dynamic institution within McGill for addressing problems of international development from an interdisciplinary and inter-regional perspective. The smooth running of our research activities continues to be attributable to the collective efforts and commitment of faculty, students, associate members and visiting scholars (listed and described throughout this report) as well as the small but dedicated CDAS staff (listed on the final page of this report). To each of them, I extend my appreciation and thanks for the work that they have contributed throughout the year. We receive enormous benefit interacting with the many Fellows (70 this year) from various parts of the world that contribute to the enrichment of our scholarship and research community. They were especially active and helpful during our international conference on "Hemispheric Civil Society" which is described as one of our highlights for this year.

➤ **Section II. HIGHLIGHTS**

During the 2002/2003 academic year, with on-going secure funding for our cooperative research program, there are several highlights to mention as part of the research record. We begin with our main SSHRC-funded research program, which focuses on the plight of civilians, particularly women and children affected by violent political conflicts and war.

Gender and Human Security Issues Program

The CDAS in association with the Women's Centre of Montreal continued its three-year action-research program with the participation of seven faculty members from McGill, Concordia and the University of Montreal (listed in last year's Annual Report and our many Newsletters). The action-research covers various levels of integrated understandings: personal and political, theoretical and practical, local and global. Our team of researchers and community activists is working locally with women refugees and immigrants in Montreal from countries of armed conflict and globally with women's organizations primarily in the six countries of the Great Lakes region of Africa. Since our research began in March 2000, there is a different world context to our research that requires added attention. Issues around immigration, refugees and asylum-seekers have moved to central concern with new policy restrictions, tightening of border controls and a less generous approach to those in fear or in need. We continue to be committed to a more open approach that contributes to everyone's sense of security. Fortunately, we were granted a one-year extension for this program in order to complete some outstanding research.

One of the highlights in the program was the all-day workshop entitled « *Over There and Over Here* » organized by Prof. Claudia Mitchell (one of our team members) which took place at McGill in November 2002. The Workshop brought together various community workers from the Montreal region who counsel young girls and other adolescents from immigrant and refugee families adapting to life in Canada. During the day, the participatory approach was also explored as a research tool both here and in other countries.

Montreal Inter-University Initiative in International Development

The *Montreal Inter-University Initiative in International Development Studies* completed its third year of programming thanks to the generous funding support of IDRC. During this academic year, we also successfully negotiated a second three-year phase (2003-2006) of this initiative with new funding (\$150,000.) from IDRC. There are several components to this *Inter-university Initiative* which are described on our CDAS website or in our newly-published booklet about the first phase.

A highlight of this program is the team of graduate student interns chosen from each of the four Montreal universities to participate in CDAS research activities (seminars, publications, conference organization, etc.) with a view to enriching their academic studies. Among other activities, the interns work on research papers and present their research findings during their six months at CDAS. During the year, Mandip Basi (graduate intern from Anthropology, Concordia University) focused her research on "The Logic of Biomedicine in Rural Punjab", Jean D'Aragon (graduate intern from Architecture, McGill University) worked on "Housing, Development and Cultural Resistance: the amaXhosa of East London, South Africa" and Chantal Robillard (graduate intern from Anthropologie, Université de Montréal) worked on "Marginalité et fragilité de la prostituée". Each of the interns was paired with a Faculty mentor from another university who guided the development of their research paper. We acknowledge with appreciation the following professors for their involvement: Margaret Lock, Anthropology, McGill; Maurice-Simon Amiel, Université de Québec à Montréal; and Duncan Pedersen, Director of the Psychosocial Research Division at the Douglas Hospital.

Another highlight of this program was a collaborative effort by the graduate interns to organize a panel discussion entitled, "Bridging the Gap in Development: Academics and Activists" on 6 February 2002. Dolores Chew, Professor of History and Humanities at Marianopolis College and President of CERAS (South Asia Centre) gave a presentation on "Books and Barricades: Can Academia and Activism be Two Sides of the Same Coin?". Boniface Bahi, doctoral candidate in Anthropology and chargé de cours at the Université de Montréal, presented on "Être scientifique et citoyen: réflexion autour de la frontière" while Professor Shree Mulay, Faculty of Medicine, McGill, and Director, McGill Centre for Research and Teaching on Women ended the discussion with a presentation entitled, "Research for Action: Community and University Alliance". The event was well-attended and extremely inspiring especially for young activist scholars.

The interns also benefited this year from two specialized workshops: one which was conducted by Prof. John Zucchi, from McGill's History Department, on academic book publishing and the second by Prof. Victor Armony from UQAM's Sociology Department who gave, for the second year, a focused workshop on research methodology. The publishing workshop that was attended by the Inter-University interns and a few fellows (due to limited space), dealt with such issues as how to choose and approach publishers, the publishing process, funding sources, and the relationship between publishing and academic tenure. Training graduate students, with the assistance of an ever-expanding network of professors in the four Montreal universities, to be better researchers in the field of international development is an essential feature of these inter-university internships.

Hemispheric Civil Society Conference

Each year, the CDAS hosts an international conference on a timely issue with the participation of our Montreal-based colleagues as well as scholars from abroad. During this academic year, we hosted a three-day Conference on "Hemispheric Civil Society" from 19-21 February 2003, with 22 presentations by participants mainly from the Americas (including Canada and Latin America), funded primarily by DFAIT. The purpose of the Conference was to engage in an open dialogue on how civil society can be strengthened in order to help build hemispheric networks and reinforce solidarity among civil society groups. In fact, the presentations were part of this larger public dialogue on civil society's role in contemporary struggles throughout the Americas where the notion of "civil society", itself, is being challenged. Massive inequalities continue to be experienced by peoples of the Americas, in part due to policies and programs that are inappropriate and imposed without engagement with the peoples of the region. With a cross-section of representative voices from various walks of life in the countries of the Americas (see **Appendix X** for list of participants and their presentations), the Conference succeeded in deepening our understanding of common problems, exchanging experiences that have worked and recommending alternative mechanisms and strategies for citizen participation and control within our societies. The Conference was organized by two CDAS Fellows, Renata Rubian and Diane Cousineau, assisted by Esteban Nicholls as well as Centre Staff, Graduate Interns and CDAS Fellows. Selected presentations from the Conference will be published at the end of the summer 2003.

CDAS Panel Discussion

One of the pressing issues of the year was the debate concerning the bombing of Iraq and the general search for peace in the Middle East through more informed understanding. Tensions and often misinformation through media coverage about the Middle East prompted the CDAS to host a panel discussion with five invited speakers/scholars as part of a dialogue on "Contemporary Islamic Movements in the Middle East" on 12 March 2003. CDAS Student Fellow Crystal Procyshen and Fariba Dashtgard, Administrative Assistant of CDAS, organized this well-attended event. The panel included presentations on US foreign policy in the Middle East and questions about whether there really is a 'clash of civilizations' (see **Appendix X** for the full list of presentations). With speakers

coming from academic as well as community-oriented backgrounds, the discussion shed light on the contextual dimension that shapes how Muslims define themselves. The debates also confronted our commonly held assumptions of Islam and politics and challenged researchers to look beyond Western rhetoric that often seeps into our understanding when drawn primarily from the media.

➤ **Section III. PLANNING AND PERFORMANCE**

A. Student Population

Student Fellows comprise the majority of the CDAS research community. They are able to apply for Fellow's status in September, January and May with the possibility of renewal each year, depending on their academic standing, their continued research related to international development, their involvement in CDAS activities and their overall performance. Full records are kept of their interests, program and activities. They come primarily from the Faculty of Arts; however, several are from the Faculties of Law, Sciences, Engineering, Environmental Sciences and Management. Many of these students are outstanding scholars who find that CDAS gives them the needed interdisciplinary research forum as well as broad international community for enrichment of their research and academic life. Most Fellows give presentations about their research work in seminars at CDAS during their tenure as Fellows (see **Appendix X** on this year's Fellows seminars). They are also involved in initiating and organizing Conferences, workshops, seminars and panel discussions on timely events.

Approximately 20 Fellows occupy shared office space at the CDAS. In the past academic year, out of the 70 Fellows associated with the Centre, 22 are McGill Student Fellows (listed in **Appendix IV**) and 30 are students from other universities (Associate Fellows are listed in **Appendix IV**). The gender breakdown of these students is 20 males and 32 females. There are 32 PhD candidates (16 females and an equal number of males) and then 20 completing their Masters (only 4 males and 16 females). As the lists indicate, the research interests of the students are diverse. More about the students can be found in **section C**. below.

B. Teaching and Learning

As CDAS is a research unit, there are no credited McGill courses offered at CDAS. Faculty Fellows teach undergraduate and graduate courses on International Development within their respective departments. The CDAS also continues to take an active role in supporting the **Undergraduate Program in International Development (IDS)** and many of our members are part of its Advisory Committee. The final IDS Seminar course for graduating IDS students is held at CDAS, which encourages IDS students to discover the unique collection of research materials available in our Gutkind Library and draw on the interdisciplinary expertise of our many Fellows. Many IDS students upon graduation become involved in the CDAS as graduate Student Fellows in various research activities. The IDS program is the largest growing program in the Faculty of Arts (approximately 750 students at this time) due in part to the visibility and recognized contribution of our research on international development throughout Canada and around the world which brings them to McGill.

We also continue to update a **selected listing of graduate courses on development** (on our website) that are being taught at the four Montreal universities, as part of our Inter-university Initiative. The idea is to make these courses better known to potential students of international development with the long-term objective of strengthening the capacity of McGill to offer a joint cooperative M.A. and/ or PhD program in international development studies. Then, there is the Graduate Interns program at CDAS which has been described above as a tailored program to train students from the four universities.

C. Student Success (graduate)

Student Fellows have made outstanding contributions in international development during this academic year. Their Conference presentations are listed in **Appendix IX**, contributions to the community in **Appendix X** and their various awards in **Appendix XVI**. We were particularly pleased to learn that six CDAS Fellows (including three former interns of the Inter-university Initiative) received the prestigious *Fonds Québécois de la recherche sur la société et la culture* (FQRSC) PhD Fellowship commencing in 2003. This Fellowship enables Quebec students to complete their doctorate either at a Quebec university, in Canada or abroad with funding for three years at \$20,000 per year. In addition, we have just learned that the new incoming Fellows' Coordinator, Andrew Grant, has been awarded the impressive Canadian Human Security Fellowship for doctoral dissertation research (worth \$15,000). We are also pleased to congratulate Associate Fellow Bruce Mabley who received the *Palme académique* at a ceremony at the French Consulate in Quebec City (May 2003).

D. Research

Research is the *raison d'être* of the CDAS and all those associated with CDAS are engaged in individual and/or team research (see **Appendix IV, XII and XIV** for the detailed research interests of CDAS members). Researchers work on development issues from various disciplines, covering a variety of themes and within different regions of the so-called developing areas (Asia, Africa, the Caribbean, Latin America and the Middle East). In the above section, we briefly described the four major collective research clusters of the CDAS, one of which (gender and human security issues) continues to be well funded. Other researchers have been equally successful in receiving funding for their research. **Appendix I** provides a list of funding ongoing or newly granted to a selection of CDAS members during the 2002/2003 academic year. The other lists, especially related to publications, demonstrate the variety of research questions that our researchers are pursuing.

E. Academic staff

This year, academic staff members associated with CDAS came together from several disciplines and various Faculties. These members are listed in **Appendix IV and XII** under "Faculty Fellows". The CDAS has three academic staff members whose *only* affiliation is with the unit

During this academic year, three additional professors in residence at CDAS have made important contributions to our research: Visiting Professor Daniel Haile (Law, McGill from Ethiopia), Professor Narendra Subramanian (Political Science, McGill, on sabbatical 2002-2003) and Dr. Qudrat-e-Khoda (Associate Professor, Aichi Guikin University, Japan).

F. Involvement in the community (academic and non-academic communities)

Appendix XI provides a selected list of community involvement of our members. Some highlights include CDAS Director Rosalind Boyd's involvement in the prestigious SSHRC Selection Committee for the Bora Laskin National Fellowship on Human Rights; the numerous radio interviews by Professors Victor Armony and Rex Brynen; and the active contributions to master and doctoral theses by Professors Badami, Echenberg, Noumoff, Orr and Scott.

➤ Section IV. **EVALUATION AND PERFORMANCE: PERTAINING TO OBJECTIVES**

New Avenues of Collaborative Research

As mentioned in the opening section of this report, the CDAS' major objective is to conduct research with the active involvement of graduate students, faculty members and others engaged in development issues. As well, the CDAS has organized its research agenda under four broad clusters, one of which (*gender and human security*) has had major funding from SSHRC' Community-University Research Alliance (CURA) program since January 2000. In fact, the CDAS was the first unit at McGill to receive this funding for collaborative research with a team of seven faculty members from McGill, Concordia and the University of Montreal. Our program is carried out in cooperation with the Women's Centre of Montreal and several other academic units described more fully in the past Annual Reports and its various Newsletters on our website. During this academic year, two new research projects got underway: One study by Pascal Musulay Mukonde, a trained lawyer specializing in international law and CDAS Fellow, is examining the state of legal protection for women and girls who have been victims of sexual violence during the devastating war in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC); the other investigation by Baudouin Hamuli Kabarbuza, a possible Visiting Researcher (not yet granted a visa), is assessing the role of civil society organizations in the consolidation of peace and democracy in light of the negative impact of the war on civilians, especially women, in the DRC.

In addition, the CDAS welcomed several new McGill Faculty Fellows to give seminar presentations on their work this year so that their research scholarship could become better known to students and researchers. **Appendix IV and XIV** summarizes the ongoing research of our community. Several of these Fellows are in stages of discussion about possible new collaborative research. We also welcomed three new Professors from our sister universities to our already large network of Inter-university Faculty Fellows, listed in **Appendix XII**: Prof. Amparo Jiménez, École des Sciences de la gestion, UQAM; Prof. Jaleel Ahmad, Economics, Concordia University; and Prof. Emmanuel Raufflet, Management, Hautes Études Commerciales (HEC). Their potential for new collaborative research endeavours can be anticipated from their contributions to research (see **Appendix XIII**).

Forums for Debate

The major international Conference on Hemispheric Civil Society, described more fully under Highlights above, addressed a central issue for many researchers in international development, namely the role of civil society in societal transformations. The debates with international and Canadian scholars meet CDAS' objective of having our research contribute to scholarly discussions on important development issues of our times. The CDAS also organized a series of Inter-University Faculty Seminars (see **Appendix VIII**); held two important Panel Discussions, "Bridging the Gap in Development: Academic and Activists" and "Contemporary Islamic Movements"; supported a Workshop entitled "Over Here and Over There" as part of our major research program on gender and human security issues and provided a forum for various Fellows Seminars, Ad Hoc Seminars and other Presentations (listed in **Appendix X**). Conference presentations given by CDAS members (listed in **Appendix IX**) illustrate the diversity of their research interests. As evidenced by the many and varied venues listed, scholars associated with CDAS are continuing to affirm CDAS as a leading Canadian research institution on international development in Quebec and abroad.

Publications Contributing to International Debate

The research results of our scholarship are published in various academic journals, academic presses and other forums which affirms our objective of continuing to contribute significantly to important international debates (see **Appendix III, XIII and XV** for the diverse listing of publications by

CDAS scholars). While the books, articles and other forms of publication are too numerous to list here, the book *Desafios de la transdisciplinariedad*. (Ed. by Alberto G. Florez-Malagon y Carmen Millan de Benavides. Bogota: Pontificia Universidad Javeriana – Instituto Pensar, 2002) requires particular mention as it indicates the depth of our collaboration with international scholars. This Spanish book, edited by a former Visiting Fellow, grows out of the Conference held at CDAS in 1999 from which the papers were published as a CDAS Monograph entitled *Social Sciences and Transdisciplinarity: Latin American and Canadian Experiences* as part of our SSHRC-funded initiative. The book is being used for a new graduate course in Colombia and contains Spanish translations of several papers, including those by long-time CDAS scholars Rosalind Boyd and Myron Frankman.

The CDAS' academic journal, *Labour Capital and Society/Travail, capital et societe*, produced two issues during this academic year. In addition to publishing well-researched articles, both of these issues contained many book reviews by our graduate student Fellows, which meets another objective of training graduate students. The current members of the journal's inter-university Editorial Committee are listed in **Appendix VII**. Circulated worldwide, the journal receives a learned journal grant from the SSHRC and a modest income from subscriptions. The journal is also on exchange with 125 important research publications that are deposited in our library. The exchange program provides the bulk of our serials, especially important journals that are used not only by our IDS students, faculty members and independent researchers but also by international visitors and consultants, as we remain the only library in Montreal with a specialized collection of materials on international development.

Discussion Papers are an important means of circulating research results rapidly. CDAS produced seven Discussion Papers (Nos 95 - 101) during this academic year, which are sent to major institutions working on international development. The complete list and some PDF files of DPS are available on our website and result in frequent requests for our research work.

Specialized Library Collection – Gutkind Library

In order to conduct research on international development, one of the most highly valued resources is a specialized library. CDAS has an outstanding collection of materials. Much of our research work is concerned with contemporary struggles and debates, which are found in so-called “shadow literature” and specialized journals. Acquired over the past 25 years, the collection in the CDAS' Gutkind Library (named in honour of the late Peter Gutkind, anthropologist, Africanist and labour studies scholar at McGill while active at CDAS) is unique in Quebec and Canada. The increasing number of Inter-Library Loan requests is a strong indicator of the importance of library materials. Throughout this academic year, the Gutkind Library has remained available to students, staff, NGOs, consultants and the wider scholarly community and has added valuable new acquisitions thanks to the exchanges and to funding from IDRC. A complete list of recent CDAS acquisitions is maintained on the Centre's website, which is managed by the CDAS librarian who also maintains the research project-related websites. We have received generous donations to our collection this year from a former professor of political science at the University of Montreal and also several McGill alumni. Cataloguing of the CDAS collection and of new acquisitions for our in-house library database was again aided this year by volunteer assistance from a graduate student in McGill's Library School.

Future Research Endeavours

Consistent with our mandate to conduct engaged research, the CDAS has planned several tasks for the coming academic year:

- to reapply for Inter-University research support under the new Quebec funding programs; this will involve re-examining our previous six-year grant to the former *Regroupement* of FCAR and developing a new strategy with our 22 colleagues;
- to conduct a self-evaluation of our program, *Montreal Inter-university Initiative*, within CDAS;
- to develop a full proposal on “Labour and the Global Economy in Eastern Africa” to submit to IDRC with Prof. Daniel Haile (CDAS Visiting Professor) as the Principal Investigator;
- to host a final international Conference on Gender and Human Security in late January 2004 which will result in a book publication; and
- to organize a *Distinguished Seminar Series* during the coming academic year in honour of our 40th Anniversary. The series entitled “Militarism and Contested Identities: Resolving Conflict in a Globalized World” has received modest funding from McGill’s Research Grants Office.

In addition to the above specific tasks, we shall also continue our research under the various on-going programs. While a few Fellows left us this year upon successful completion of their degrees, 25 new Fellows joined the CDAS during this academic year. With 70 Fellows involved in the work of the CDAS thanks in part to important external funding, we continue to feel the strain of limited financial assistance from McGill. We have a small but dedicated staff doing extraordinary work, often under pressure. For the coming academic year, we want to correct that situation and have applied for financial Centre support from McGill for improved staff infrastructure.

In Memoria

*It seems every year we are saddened by the passing of our colleagues. During this academic year, a long-time Associate Fellow of CDAS, Dr Charles D. Smith passed away on 10 April 2003 after battling cancer for over two years. Charles has been associated with CDAS on and off since 1971 when he completed his BA and a Master’s degree in 1975, both at McGill in Sociology. He then went to teach at the University of Dar es Salaam, Tanzania where he also conducted research for his PhD completed in 1985 for the University of Essex, England. Later, he returned to teach at Moi University in Kenya (1990-2000) while maintaining his association with CDAS through seminars, articles and book reviews in **Labour, Capital and Society** and other contributions. He authored several significant scholarly articles and received important accolades for his outstanding book **Ecology, Civil Society and the Informal Economy in North West Tanzania** (Ashgate: Averbury Press, 2001). As a long-time colleague and friend, I shall miss his thoughtful and kind manner.*

Many of us were also saddened to learn that CBC radio reporter David McLaughlin, who spoke at the CDAS on 27 March 2003, had died suddenly of brain cancer on Sunday, 25 May 2003. David had been in touch with me at CDAS before he went to Northern Uganda to do a story on child soldiers in 2001. Then, when he returned from the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) in 2003 and after he had completed his radio programs with assistance from some of our African students, he agreed to give a presentation about the impact of the civil war on the people of the DRC. As was evident from the many human tragedies he covered, he cared passionately about this neglected war where over three million people have died since 1999. In a simple but compelling manner, he told the stories of many individuals whose lives were devastated by this conflict. He desperately wanted more attention paid to this war so that the killings would stop. As many of you know, we are also supporting peace efforts in the Great Lakes region of Africa as part of our Gender and Human Security research program.
