# **CONFERENCE ON GENDER AND HUMAN SECURITY**

# 5, 6 and 7 February 2004

The Centre for Developing-Area Studies (CDAS), McGill University is organizing an international conference on Gender and Human Security from 5-7 February 2004, which will address human security from the perspective of the rights and needs of people in societies confronted by political violence. For the past three years, in partnership with the Women's Centre of Montréal and other universities, CDAS has carried out a research program on gender and human security in the context of war and reconstruction. Our team of researchers and community activists are working locally with women refugees and immigrants in Montreal from various countries of armed conflict and internationally with women's organizations primarily in the Great Lakes region of Africa.

Globally, war-torn societies and armed conflicts are producing more internally displaced persons, refugees and immigrants than ever before, many of whom are women coming to Canada in pursuit of a new life with personal security. During armed conflicts, community-level violence and its consequences (violent crimes against women, refugee movements) indicate that gender is central to the struggle against insecurity. Combining human security and gender allows us to examine among other issues the impact of gender inequality on the continued insecurity in societies affected by conflict and its aftermath.

Accordingly, the goal of our Conference is to examine security issues not only in Africa but also in Canada and other parts of the world where the search for peace often seems elusive. CDAS proposes to bring together participants from both the academic and community milieu whose research or action-research will contribute to the elaboration of intervention strategies addressing security issues in conflict and post-conflict situations.

We invite those interested in making a presentation at the Conference to submit their provisional title and brief abstract (80 words) to the CDAS in English or in French (pub.cdas@mcgill.ca) by 10 November 2003. Full papers (30 pages or 8,000 words) should be sent by 15 January 2004. The CDAS plans to publish a book developed from the presentations given at the Conference.

CDAS Director **Rosalind Boyd** was an invited speaker at two recent conferences related to her research as Director and Principal Investigator of the CDAS' gender and human security program financed by SSHRC. In August, she presented on "Masculinity, men and gender in security discussions" as part of the two-day Conference *Canadian Perspectives on Security, Conflict and Gender: Advancing Research, Advocacy and Policy* held at the Centre for International and Security Studies, York University, Toronto and organized by the Gender and Peacebuilding Working Group, the Canadian Committee on Women, Peace and Security, the Canadian Research Institute for the Advancement of Women and the Canadian Consortium on Human Security.

In mid-October, she attended a two-day Symposium in Berlin entitled *Human Security=Women's Security? No sustainable security without a gender perspective*. She gave a presentation on "The Canadian Human Security Approach: A Gender-Sensitive Strategy?" for the Closing Panel. The Symposium was organized by the Feminist Institute of the Heinrich Boll Foundation in collaboration with the Friedrich Ebert Foundation and the Women's Security Council, Berlin, Germany. The Feminist Institute organized an additional enriching program for the five foreign visitors during the week.

# **BIBLIOTHÈQUE GUTKIND LIBRARY**

The Gutkind Library, Québec's only academic research library on the developing world and North-South relations, is open for interested students, scholars and the general public this fall with a vast array of the latest development literature. Because of the very successful publications exchange program which CDAS operates through its journal *LABOUR*, *Capital and Society*, hundreds of periodicals, monographs and research reports come regularly to the Gutkind Library. A complete list

of recent acquisitions can always be found on the CDAS website at <a href="www.mcgill.ca/cdas/list.pdf">www.mcgill.ca/cdas/list.pdf</a>. Visitors this fall to the Gutkind Library might find the following publications to be of interest: <a href="mailto:Marga Journal">Marga Journal</a>, a Sri Lankan periodical focusing upon development policy issues, is back after a prolonged absence due to recent turmoil in that South Asian nation. We welcome the Marga Institute back to our community of scholars. We have also recently acquired an interesting collection of development papers from the Institute of International Studies in Copenhagen. The IIS results from the merger of the Centre for Development Research, a long time CDAS exchange partner, with several other Danish research institutes this year. We certainly hope that the IIS is as productive and as progressive in its research as the CDR was.

Professor Catherine LeGrand, of McGill's Department of History, very thoughtfully donated to the Gutkind Library a collection of books, periodicals and assorted documents from Nicaragua and Central America in the 1980s. Such material from this "revolutionary" phase of Central America's history will doubtlessly be very useful to present and future scholars. Once this "LeGrand Collection" is thoroughly catalogued and archived it will be made available to researchers.

Another recent acquisition of note is a collection of policy papers from the Canadian HIV/AIDS Legal Network, which are certainly applicable to current studies of the pandemic and strategies to combat it in the developing world. Finally, we continue to receive a significant quantity of research publications from the Centre for Development Studies in Trivandrum and its Kerala Research Programme for Local Level Development. These papers should be of great interest to anyone studying local level and rural development issues in South Asia.
